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ICHS is a federally-qualified health center (FQHC) that opened in 1973 to serve the needs of Asian Pacific Islanders in Seattle's International District. In 2011, ICHS doctors, dentists and staff members continued to excel at meeting the multilingual health care needs of an increasingly-diverse Puget Sound area, even as government budget cuts were felt. ICHS provided quality care in 53 languages and dialects to anyone in need, especially the uninsured, the low income, immigrants and refugees. In 2011, as the Great Recession's impact lingered, ICHS had a total of 168,400 patient, community member and other health-related encounters. More than 21,400 individuals contributed to these encounters. The number of unduplicated FQHC patients remained high at 18,585 – a 16% jump from 2008. These patients made more than 80,300 visits to ICHS. Most visits occurred at the International District and Holly Park clinics. ICHS also operates clinics at Seattle World School and Asian Counseling and Referral Service. ICHS assisted patients from Seattle and the Puget Sound area - and 75.7% of them were 200% below the federal poverty level. Of all patients, 31% lacked insurance and 60% were female. Coordinated care, behavioral health and health education, especially with hepatitis and diabetes, were priorities. Among ICHS accomplishments: Provided \$2.1 million in uncompensated care, continued its Women's Preventive Health Services through generous funding from the Tateuchi Foundation, advocated with other health clinics for a strong health care safety net and opened a health clinic at Seattle World School/NOVA High School.

ICHS Department and Program Highlights

MEDICAL

In 2011, our Medical Program provided 55,784 medical visits to 14,921 patients, which continues a 4% increase in the number of patients served since 2009. Care for chronic conditions such as diabetes and hypertension continued to be among the most frequent reasons for seeking care.

Our Pharmacy Program continued its expanded clinical services to include medication consultation for patients with multiple chronic conditions. The prescription volume increased 2.6% from 2010 to 2011 with a 17% increase in total revenue. The Pharmacy Program also began a partnership with the University of Washington School of Pharmacy to become a training site for their students.

DENTAL

In 2011, our Dental Program provided 22,102 dental visits to 7,096 unduplicated patients, which represents a continued increase of 15% in patients helped since 2009. The program was hard hit with the elimination of state Medicaid funding for adult dental services except for emergency procedures. ICHS remains steadfastly committed to continuing to serve adults and children.

DIABETES

ICHS successfully held diabetes training for 10 community representatives from the Filipino, Samoan and Chamorro communities. These community members led diabetes education and support groups. The focus of this project is to spread the success that ICHS has had internally to greater numbers of people in order to support diabetes management and prevention on a broader level.

WOMEN'S PREVENTIVE HEALTH SERVICES

ICHS runs support groups for women in Cantonese, Mien and Vietnamese. More than 50 women attend these groups each month - many were formerly feeling socially isolated and this has provided an opportunity to interact with peers as well as gain valuable health information and support.

Number of women reached through community interventions: 3,661

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Community Advocates participated in fairs and community events during weekends throughout the year and specifically in the summer. Staff provided ICHS information to 3,196 fair and event attendees at more than 25 events.

Patient- and staff-created digital stories about diabetes, tobacco, breast cancer, access to healthy foods, affordable physical activity and other topics were used to raise awareness with patients and the greater community through the Internet. The digital story project received support from a grant called Mapping Our Voices for Equality (MOVE). The grant funded the training and filming, as well as a computer kiosk for the waiting room where patients can view the multilingual stories. WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC)

WIC made over 2,000 referrals to medical, dental, immunization and other health services – of which, 90% were made to ICHS providers. The ICHS WIC program alone contributed about \$1 million to the local economy through the food vouchers that were provided to the families living in poverty. ICHS WIC staff also helped develop the "nursing mother" policy which enabled patients and staff members at ICHS to breastfeed their infants when needed. ICHS became a recognized "breastfeeding friendly" facility in the state. WIC served over 1,900 clients in 2011, including women, infants and children up to age 5.
